3. Will be devoted to 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE CHARTER OF VENICE following the three-year scientific plan 2024-2027 defined by ICOMOS.

The questioning of the Venice Charter will arise throughout the symposium and the round table, incorporating new topics of shared and intangible heritage.

5 moderators will lead us through this day and a half: Faika Bejaoui, Siame Hanna Ishac, Teresa Colletta, Sofia Avgerinou-Kolonias and Antoine Bruguerolle.

Exchange on the best practices and innovations that are developing across our regions; it is a valuable opportunity to share our experiences, learn from each other and create partnerships to build a resilient future.
